My Cousin's Wedding in Egypt

On August 14th, 2023, my mother and I went to Egypt for my cousin's wedding. My cousin Michael, the groom, married his long-term girlfriend. We were not the only family members from out of town that attended the wedding. We had families from Canada, Austria, Dubai, and Saudi Arabia. There was my aunt and her daughter's family who came from Canada. My aunt's husband came from Saudia Arabia. My aunt from Austria came with her youngest daughter. Then there was my last aunt who still lives in a place in Egypt called Port Said (in Arabic it is called Bursaeid). She came with her husband, her daughter, and her son and his family. In total, there were about thirteen members on the groom's mother's side who attended the wedding.

My relatives and I were living in my cousin Christine's apartment prior to the wedding. In the apartment, we could hear dogs, people praying out loud, and a lot of cars honking. We also came at a time in which the weather was staggeringly hot and we were without electricity for two hours per day for the whole six weeks. Sometimes the government would cut the electricity off for four hours. It was an interesting experience for me. In the apartment we used fans to keep cool but when did not have electricity, then we would go out to the balcony for fresh air.

During the two weeks leading up to the wedding, my aunt from Port Said and my aunt from Gratz, Austria were trying to fix everyone's dresses with the use of a sewing machine. It was a lovely sight to see my aunts working together calmly and collectively. My aunt from Port Said fixed her dress, the groom's sister's and his mother's dresses, and my dress. After all those dress alterations, my aunts vowed never to fix any dresses again for any occasion.

Two days before the wedding, we had a bachelor party where both the families of the groom and the bride came together to celebrate the wedding. At the wedding, we went at 6:00pm and the wedding ceremony took half an hour. After the wedding ceremony, there was a line up in order to congratulate the two families. It took another half an hour before we headed to the wedding reception. The bride and groom began the wedding reception with a great entrance that blew me away. It was a well-choreographed entrance. There was flaming torches that would accompany the bride and groom as they walk towards the dance floor. We danced the night away and it was a memorable celebration.

I have known him since I was a teenager. He was my brother's friend. When he was 20 years old, his mother died of cancer.




